Reenvisioning the Harold Avenue Greenspace

The Harold Avenue Greenspace is a mulchy, damp end to Muriel as it turns the corner to Harold Avenue. It is a weedy lot inaccessible behind a wood railing. *Why would we stop here?* There's no path, no steps, no sports field, only a power line stretching into the forest, taunting us as it disappears from view, leaving us behind. *Why stop here?* The value of the Harold Avenue Greenspace, which the City has designated a passive greenspace under the stewardship of the Lake Claire neighborhood, may not be obvious in our hyper-connected, instant-delivery world. *So why stop?*


To look through a glass-bottom boat. Animals, plants, insects—all these critters are living, hiding, eating, fighting, mating, basking on a sunny limb with squinted eyes, existing totally separate from us. And that's a thought worth contemplating.

The Harold Avenue Greenspace gives a window into the culture of the Frazer Forest.

It sounds different here. Smells different. Looks different. It's not a people place. A quick glance at light beams through the trees delights with its beauty. A longer, quieter look can still our souls and lead our minds in a new way. This forest edge attracts plenty of wildlife. The topography, with its eye-level hillside and overview of the spring-fed creek, gives prime vantage points for observation. It's our own neighborhood branch of Zoo Atlanta. And while pandas are unlikely to

show their furry faces here when we peer over the edge into the dappled light, a friendly raccoon just might be gazing back, or the startling eyes of an owl, or the soft shape of a rabbit. Wait quietly and look, and be rewarded with the flickering dance of small wings among the branches. You may not love it more than your iPhone's new screensaver, but it will give you something new to post to Twitter.

Undisturbed for many years, the three lots of the Harold Avenue Greenspace were under consideration for private development in the early 2000s. Through negotiations among the City, development interests, and the neighborhood, these lots were transferred to City ownership in 2007, with the understanding that Lake Claire would take responsibility for this ecologically strategic land. Lake Claire celebrated its newest gem in style with a street dance and

live music, and then began the process of ecologically integrating the nascent greenspace with the Frazer Forest at its backdoor.

Invasive species have mostly been cleared, thanks to neighborhood efforts, and the land is ready for the native ecosystem to return. The battle with invasive species will continue, as kudzu, privet, mahonia, nandina, liriope, and Japanese stilt grass are relentless competitors, and animals bring new seeds to the greenspace from Lake Claire yards. However, native plantings help bring the ecosystem back into equilibrium, giving local plants a head start. With ongoing care (and your help in removing invasive plants from your own yards), this site can be completely transformed.

A new planting plan is ready for installation, with plants chosen to mimic naturally occurring plant communities in the Piedmont physiographic region. These plants provide food, shelter, and nesting areas for forest creatures, from simple chickadees to swooping owls. Fruit-producing trees offer tasty treats for foxes and raccoons, yet will be located away from vehicle traffic so as to not lure critters to dangerous places. Along the sunny street edge, life's pace quickens, with colorful perennials and a variety of native shrubs in interesting shapes and hues. These sunnier plants are key food and shelter providers for birds, butterflies, and bees. Benches

along the street edge are a comfortable distance from the bird bath and butterfly rocks, inviting shy animals to linger in plain sight. The existing stump circle and basketball goal remain clear of new plantings to give room for impromptu gatherings and foul balls. Overlooks along the existing Boy Scouts' fence give opportunities for us to "press our noses to the glass" and peer into the beyond.

It's time to call out the helping hands! Lake Claire will host a planting day in upcoming weeks to begin decorating the Harold Avenue Greenspace with its new jewels. Work will continue in the spring and in the years ahead. Future plans include posting interpretive signage to highlight features of the greenspace. If you'd like to be a part of it all, come out and dig, donate a plant, or offer to help with interpretive signage. If you have questions, contact the non-official greenspace crew (Roger Swift, Dan White, and Kathy Evans) or Elise Cormier, the Lake Claire environmental officer and planting plan designer, at the next neighborhood meeting or via email or telephone. We look forward to seeing you at the greenspace, gazing into the mist of the Frazer Forest and seeing it in a new light.



Update on Residential/Neighborhood Parking Enforcement

The City of Atlanta Department of Public Works and PARKatlanta are modernizing the city's parking operations to improve convenience, access, fairness, and service for city motorists, residents, businesses, and visitors. PARKatlanta has begun to respond to complaints/requests for parking enforcement in all areas, including commercial and residential areas. Parking enforcement will be resourced in a greater amount than in recent years, serving as an additional resource to the Atlanta Police Department.

We want to inform you about three key items related to this program: state and municipal parking regulations, additional town hall meetings in the next few weeks, and PARKatlanta's plan to further help communities acclimate to the program.

State and Municipal Parking Regulations

PARKatlanta has the responsibility to enforce parking regulations, including state parking laws citywide. These state regulations were *established to impact quality of life, protect citizens, and prevent safety hazards*. Examples of these regulations include parking in a crosswalk, parking too close to an intersection, parking on a sidewalk, and blocking or parking too close to fire hydrants. Please review these regulations by visiting www.parkatlanta.org, and *please be mindful that municipal signage for parking rules will prevail over the state regulations*.

Town Hall Meetings

The City of Atlanta Department of Public Works and PARKatlanta will be hosting a series of Community Town Hall meetings in the next few weeks. These meetings will take place in Northeast, Southeast, Southwest, Northwest, and Intown

Atlanta. These meetings will be located and scheduled to accommodate as many citizens as possible. We will send further information about locations and times as soon as venues are confirmed.

Residential Parking Permit Program

PARKatlanta is responsible for enforcing the *current* Residential Permit Program in applicable areas. If you reside within a residential parking permitted area, we encourage you to maintain a current permit. Residential Parking Permits may be obtained from Atlanta City Hall, Department of Public Works, Office of the Commissioner, at 55 Trinity Avenue SW, Atlanta, GA 30303. For more information on the Residential Parking Permit Program, please call (404) 330-6240, or send an email to publicworks@atlantaga.gov.

Additional Information

You will begin to see signs posted on the streets in your neighborhood where applicable. PARKatlanta will also issue warning citations and distribute parking education flyers for a period of two weeks prior to full enforcement.

News from Mary Lin Elementary School

Mary Lin has long embraced an anti-bullying policy, but this year the school is going one step further, partnering with Inman

Park resident Dr. Kelli Ritter to promote a school-wide pro-peace climate that will foster inclusion and discourage bullying. Dr.

Ritter holds a PhD in counseling from Georgia State University, where she specialized in child and family counseling. She is the author of *Come Play with Me!* and conducts workshops and classes for parents, teachers, and caregivers.

Dr. Brian Mitchell, Mary Lin's principal, first talked with Dr. Ritter about collaborating two years ago, and last year Dr. Ritter began working with Dr. Mitchell, assistant principal Mary Benton, and school counselor Brenda Stroman. One of Dr. Ritter's first steps was to gather information from the teachers and staff about the nature of any bullying issues present at Mary Lin. Over the summer, Dr. Ritter reviewed the survey results, and after more interviews with teachers and consultations with staff, she and Dr. Mitchell committed to launching a program entitled "You Can't Say You Can't Play." This program is based on the

work of MacArthur Fellowship (Genius Grant) recipient Vivian Gussin Paley.

During Back to School Night in September, Dr. Ritter was introduced to parents and described the concept of "You can't say you can't play," explaining that students are taught that they are not to exclude other students from their play and are given strategies to implement the policy. The goal is to build courageous kids and to empower students in a positive way. Dr. Ritter and Dr. Mitchell have already visited all the classrooms to introduce the program to the students, and Dr. Ritter will begin working more in depth with the kindergarten classrooms this fall. The partnership will continue this year as the school works to expand its multifaceted approach to preventing bullying in all forms.

Lake Claire Neighbors Meeting: October Minutes

October 21, 2010

Led by Glenn Frankel

Attended by 23 neighbors (5 officers) and 5 guests

Minutes recorded by Heidi Hill

Glenn Frankel, president of Lake Claire Neighbors, opened the meeting at 7:05 pm by asking for additions to the meeting agenda. Trace Haythorn, executive director of the Frazer Center, asked to be added. Glenn then invited the gathered to introduce themselves by name and street. A neighbor who works for public radio asked if she could interview individual neighbors after the meeting for a story on electricity rates and the Georgia Power rate hike.

1) MARTA Mobility bus update. Trace Haythorn spoke first, giving a follow-up on the conversations between the Frazer Center and MARTA on the Mobility bus traffic in the neighborhood. He said that at its peak, MARTA was sending 40 buses through the center, for a total of 160 passes a day. A new schedule and new routes have been set, with no more than five to eight buses passing through the center a day. This schedule is expected to take effect in the coming weeks.

Haythorn also gave an update on a recent performance in the Cator Woolford Gardens that took neighbors on Lakeshore and staff at the garden and the center by surprise. The center has since reached out to the Lakeshore neighbors and invited them to help manage such disruptions, as well as invasive plants in the Frazer Forest. With a new policy on noise control, the center does not anticipate further issues.

In closing, Haythorn mentioned that he had recently spoken with the police precinct in DeKalb County, who agreed to patrol the center on weekends, which will benefit the neighborhood as well.

A neighbor, Kevin Tomson-Hooper, asked Haythorn about buses staging outside the center. He said he had spoken to drivers idling on the curb and told them they were not supposed to stage along Ridgewood, but they acted as if they did not know this. Could this be addressed in the conversations with MARTA? He added that the neighborhood liaison group would welcome an opportunity to sit in on one of the meetings.

Another neighbor, Katie Brady, added that the buses idle for up to forty-five minutes, while the drivers stand outside and talk on their cell phones.

Haythorn responded that the keys to resolving this issue are talking to the drivers and helping identify an appropriate off-site staging area.

Tomson-Hooper offered two staging suggestions: the parking lot of Clifton Sanctuary Ministries and the Candler Park MARTA station lot.

Neighbor Emily Veazey asked if they could stage in the garden's parking lot. Haythorn said the problem with that was the instability of the road between the center and the garden, and it would also depend on

the time of day.

Another neighbor asked what staging was. Haythorn explained that it was what diesel buses had to do between pickups. Neighbor Kathy Evans asked why the buses had to wait at the center rather than at their next destination. Haythorn said it was a good question, but he didn't know the answer. He added that they'd come a long way in resolving the issues with the buses, but know they still have a ways to go.

Glenn invited concerned neighbors to follow up with the Tomson-Hoopers or Trace Haythorn.

2) Home & Garden Tour wrap-up. Glenn thanked the tour committee members and neighborhood volunteers for their efforts. I was asked to give a brief postmortem. The event was more successful than the committee had hoped, raising over \$4,000 for the neighborhood and for Clifton Sanctuary Ministries. The proceeds would be split evenly among the two organizations.

3) Neighborhood yard sale announcement. Glenn announced that the neighborhood yard sale would take place on the coming Saturday, October 23. Over thirty homes had signed up to participate. Glenn had created a map of the homes, which was posted on the website.

4) Lake Claire Halloween parade announcement. Glenn announced

that the Halloween parade, one of the longest-running traditions in the neighborhood, would be held on Saturday, October 30. No one was able to take over the organizing duties, so this year's event would be more low-key. Parents and kids in costume were invited to meet at the dead-end of Marlbrook at 4:15 for the parade, which would begin at 4:30. Neighbors not participating in the parade were asked to stand on the sidelines and cheer. After the parade, there would be treats and free play in the park, and Glenn reminded everyone that the last Candler Park Screen on the Green movie, *Monsters vs. Aliens*, would be shown that night at 6:30.

A neighbor asked if the neighborhood would be trick-or-treating Saturday or Sunday night. Glenn said there had been some discussion on the parents' group about it, but we'd probably stick with Sunday.

Another neighbor asked if Bill Fleming would still play with his band at the Candler Park Market on Halloween. Glenn said he would find out and send out a newscast with the details.

5) Public safety report. Valen-

cia Hudson, public safety liaison for councilmember Natalyn Archibong, was invited to speak. She said they were working on finding funds to repair Lake Claire Park. Almeta had been repaired, and a request for a four-way stop at McLendon and Ridgewood was being reviewed by the Department of Public Works.

A neighbor asked about the analysis that had been done for a proposed speed bump on Ridgewood. Hudson said it was determined that the speeding wasn't great enough to warrant a speed bump. Buses and ambulances that travel to the Frazer Center were also a consideration.

Kevin Tomson-Hooper asked when Ridgewood would be paved. It was ground down the weekend of October 2. Hudson said she would find out. Another neighbor asked about high water bills. Hudson said they would eventually go down.

A neighbor asked how much it would cost to repair Lake Claire Park. Hudson said probably close to \$25,000.

Sara Tomson-Hooper thanked Hudson for supporting the neighborhood on the MARTA Mobility bus issue but said there was still a problem with staging. Hudson said she would ask the church [Clifton Sanctuary Ministries—Ed.] to see if they could stage there. Elise Cormier said that a lot of people live around Clifton too, and it would not be

a better solution. When a neighbor suggested the Candler Park MARTA station parking lot, Hudson said it would be too far. Kathy asked if she would look into why the drivers had to leave the buses running while they waited, and Hudson said she'd look into it.

6) Update on 911 issues. Terri Thornberry, director of 911 Communications for the Atlanta Police Department, was introduced to talk about recent problems among neighbors who have called 911. She began by giving her background with 911 and an overview of the processes at 911. She explained that there are eleven call takers in Atlanta who work three shifts: 7 am–3 pm, 3–11 pm, and 11 pm–7 am. Even when fully staffed, the lines can be quickly overrun with calls. Thornberry also explained the process of hiring a call taker, which, with all the testing, interviews, and training, can take forty weeks.

To put things in perspective, she explained that during the week of October 4–10 at the Atlanta call center, nearly 20,000 calls were taken.

A neighbor asked why you must be routed to 911 if you have a minor car accident. Thornberry explained that

a certain number of the forty-three call lines are for nonemergency calls.

Glenn asked Kathy Evans to give background on the specific neighborhood concerns. Kathy said that neighbors in emergency situations had experienced technical delays. In one case, a family had a medical emergency, and the ambulance never arrived. Thornberry said that if it was a call from a cell phone, it would have been routed to the closest call center and then transferred to the appropriate center. Valencia Hudson said in this particular case, the family kept getting bounced back and forth between DeKalb and Atlanta and ended up taking the child to the hospital.

Kathy mentioned another recent case of a person being attacked and having trouble with 911.

Another representative of 911 Communications said that with EMS calls, because we live on the border of DeKalb and Atlanta, there might be confusion as to which is the right call center. In the first case, the father asked to be transferred but had originally been routed to the right center.

A neighbor asked about the number given for 911 calls from a cell phone. The representative said that the ten-digit number [(404) 658-6666—Ed.] was created specifically for alarm calls, but you still have to give your location first when calling from a cell phone, whether calling 911 or the ten-digit number. Your location comes up only if you're on a landline phone.

Another neighbor asked about Internet phone calls. The representative said that if you use VoIP, you must transfer your locations so the correct location pops up.

Thornberry returned to the case where the neighbor was robbed and the police showed up late. She explained that the call takers and dispatchers involved had all made mistakes. All four had been suspended for their actions. The other 911 representative added that the incident was not a training issue, but a matter of the call takers trying to get off the phone at the end of their shift.

A neighbor expressed concern about the fact that EMS calls are handled differently than police calls and serviced by different places. She suggested that there are ways to keep critical errors from happening, even if it means changing the boundaries of the call centers.

Hudson offered that call takers should wait to make sure a transfer is correct before disconnecting. Atlanta stays on the line, but other jurisdictions should as well.

A neighbor asked for advice on what Lake Claire neighbors should do when calling 911. The 911 representative said that whichever call center picks up, tell the call taker your location first and let them determine where the call needs to go. She added that of 8,400 calls, they had only 10 complaints. Thornberry

said that of the 18,750 calls the week of October 4–10, 16,400 were answered in ten seconds or less. The standard is to answer at least 90 percent in 10 seconds or less.

Katie Brady offered to follow up with 911 for an article for the *Clarion*.

7) APD update. Officer Sinks talked about recent robberies in Kirkwood and the Highlands. Two people had been picked up in connection with the robberies. He urged neighbors to be aware of their surroundings and call 911 if anything seemed suspicious. He said that generally crime was down on the evening shift in the neighborhood.

Emily Veazey asked about reports of a light-colored sedan that had been mentioned in connection with recent robberies. Did it have South Carolina plates? The officer said he had not heard that, but they'd only been getting vague reports on the vehicle.

8) Update on Harold Avenue greenspace. Elise Cormier, VP of Environment for LCN, spoke about the planting plan she had done for the Harold Avenue greenspace. She gave background on the land and then passed out the before images and after images. She invited neighbors to help implement the plan or donate a native plant. Sarah Wynn asked if food sources for birds that are taken out would be replaced. Elise said they would.

Glenn asked about a time frame for the planting. Elise said planting would begin this fall in early November and pick up again in the spring. She added that another way to help with the effort is to remove invasive plants from our own yards, whose seeds get delivered to the greenspace by birds. She spoke about a proposed native plant sale, and a neighbor offered that some neighbors may have native plants in their yards they'd like to donate.

9) Clarion staff positions and openings. I gave a brief of description of the four roles: distribution, layout & design, advertising, and editorial. We are currently seeking an advertising volunteer. [See information in this issue of the *Clarion*.—Ed.] The position of editor will be open as of January 2011. Contact me at editor@lakeclaire.org with interest or for more details.

10) Officer nominations for the neighborhood executive committee in 2011. Glenn explained that nominations would be accepted at this meeting and voted on in November. He also announced that if no one stepped forward as a nominee for president, a suggestion had been made that the organization could use a different model, with all executive committee members sharing the president duties. Kathy Evans explained that the committee is already cooperative and shares in decision making. In this new model,

the committee members could take turns each month leading the neighborhood meeting and responding to emails and calls. In order to implement this model, the bylaws would have to be changed, and the vote for president would have to be deferred.

Glenn then discussed the various executive committee roles and announced who had been nominated so far. Cara Stevens would run again for treasurer. Heidi Hill would run for VP of Communications. Tish Ganey has volunteered to take on the role of webmaster and convert our website to a blog format. Dan White would run again for VP of Zoning. Robby Handley, who created the garden at Clifton, had asked to be nominated for VP of Environment. Jen Horn, the current VP of Public Safety, had not announced if she would run again. Kathy Evans and Jen Sams had agreed to run again as the NPU rep and the NPU rep alternate, respectively. Cynthia Baer had volunteered to run as VP of Fun[d]raising.

A neighbor asked about the stipulation that nominees must have attended at least four neighborhood meetings in the year. Glenn explained that the committee felt that attendance at other neighborhood meetings, such as for the home tour or the dog park exploratory committees, counted toward this requirement.

Katie Brady nominated Kevin Tomson-Hooper for VP of Zoning.

A discussion ensued about changing the model of the presidency. One neighbor voiced a concern about the proposed shared presidency. Glenn said that the committee could consider rotating duties as discussed in the absence of a nominee. The next year, the neighborhood could go back to the original model if a nominee stepped forward. The neighbor asked if having co-presidents was an option. Glenn said it hadn't been considered, but it could be discussed. He added that if the role wasn't filled, the executive committee could appoint someone.

A neighbor asked if nominations were closed after tonight, or could they be emailed before the next month's meeting. Glenn said he would have to check the bylaws. Next month, those running uncontested would be elected; in the case of VP of Zoning, there would be a vote. Glenn explained that the bylaws could be found on the website.

Sarah Wynn, the outgoing liaison to Clifton Sanctuary Ministries, stepped forward and nominated herself for president. Much clapping ensued.

Glenn ended the meeting by saying that the land-use voting item had been deferred at the applicant's request.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:47 pm.
