“The push is on to complete Deepdene, the last segment of the Olmsted Linear Park, so we hope to make this the most successful fundraiser ever,” said Gloria Seymour, chair of the gala. “If you appreciate the beauty of the first five parks and you’re eager to explore the forest and stream in Deepdene, then make your reservation today! You can support the restoration and enjoy a great evening at the same time.”

To put it in the context of Lake Claire, Deepdene is the eastern-most segment of the Olmsted Linear Park, which includes Dellwood, Shadyside, Oak Grove, Virgil Lee and Springdale parks. Dellwood and Shadyside straddle Clifton Road at S. Ponce. Deepdene is at the north end of Lakeshore Drive and is a continuation of the Frazer Forest. The gala will feature silent and live auctions to benefit the Olmsted Linear Park Alliance (OLPA), the nonprofit organization that is raising the last \$800,000 in the seven-year campaign. Guests will enjoy sumptuous hors d’oeuvres and a full bar. Although flapper dresses and raccoon coats

are optional, members of the planning committee have already begun practicing the Charleston!

The pool is undergoing major renovations to bring the pool and bathhouse in compliance with the Americans-with-Disabilities-Act. Beyond these improvements, the City asked us what other changes we want.

The top priorities are: (1) Adding a young child wet play area, (2) installing shade structures, and (3) improving seating around the pool.

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The Conscientious Gardener

I was thinking about poinsettias recently bloom for Christmas. But I haven't abandoned layers of black plastic (trash bags) and continue not succumbed to heat and inconsistent water-

Sources I have read recommend a routine of restricting sunlight to plants as early as only. I don't have that much time or energy to keep will have to stay in place with the sun blocked until I'm ready to look at it again. I did this last year with a bit of success. I think that starting the process of "forcing blooms" (a misnomer in this case) as early as you can in the season may be the trick.

So, in the absence of timely advice on preserving poinsettias and getting them to bloom on time, how about this. This year, let's put our "spent" plants at the street NEXT TO the trash/recycling to allow neighbors who want to keep them going to pick them up. This is also an opportunity to recycle planting soil from the dead plants.

There are many sources of seasonal decorative materials in plants found in your yard and around the neighborhood. Holly sprigs and berries, magnolia leaves, mahonia sprigs, mistletoe, lavender and rosemary among others.



and realized that it is probably too late to get them to mine yet. I plan to cover "it" with a couple of watering and feeding. I have only one left that has ing, so it must be hardy.

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This month's tips:

Harvest the seeds of your favorite annual and perennial flowering plants for spring planting. Even if you are unsure of what the seeds look like, just pull the dead dry flower heads. Store them in paper envelopes or partially open plastics. You can also make small air holes if needed. They need to be kept quite dry. Ones that will grow reliably are zinnias, coreopsis, coneflower and mums among others. Liatris, a striking narrow purple wand-shaped flower, is less reliable but worth the effort.

Hopefully you have a sunny place for your potted plants to live over the winter. It will be time to bring them in soon. The indoor air will likely be too dry for optimum plant health so either provide them with a humidifier or frequently (every day or two) spray with water. Most plants will do better if the soil is kept moist.



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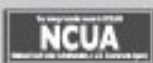
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Better Safe Than Sorry for the Holidays

The holidays are upon us! Along with the fun and festivities, this is high time for crimes of opportunity. Baddies will be looking for vacated houses for easy pickings and possibly cars left behind for days. There are a few things that can be done to prevent yourself from becoming a victim of crime during the holidays. Most importantly, **TELL YOUR NEIGHBORS THAT YOU WILL BE GONE AND HOW LONG YOU WILL BE GONE.** Neighbors and the community are the best defense against crime. I have received several accounts over the past few weeks of neighbors watching out for their fellow neighbors which directly resulted in the prevention of crime. The preventive steps are usually a neighbor simply stepping outside and making his/her presence known to the perpetrator (in one case, a neighbor actually followed the perpetrator's car to a house while having the police on the line; the police were able to arrive within minutes and make the arrest. Additionally, the Atlanta Police Department has set up a program where residents can notify the APD that they will be leaving the City for an extended period of time; the APD will run occasional patrols out to/by your house to check it out. (Note that this is far less likely to actually prevent crime unless the perpetrators are caught in the act; again, neighbors are your best defense!). The vacation patrols may be requested by filling out a form that you can obtain from our Zone 6 officers: please contact Zone 6 at (404) 371-5002 to request the forms.

Want to learn more? The APD is accepting nominations for participants in their Citizens Police Academy Training Course. The CPATC provides training on law enforcement and explanations of police activity and modern crime prevention techniques. Also, if you are interested in forming a Neighborhood Watch Program, the APD can help you and your fellow neighbors organize. Usually NWP's are formed around a street or blocks of a street. They are essentially a more regimented version of keeping your neighbors informed about when/where you will be and asking them to keep a look out for you. We have a couple of active NWP's in Lake Claire; if you are interested in putting one together with your fellow neighbors, please contact Ruby Naylor at Zone 6 at the above number.

Finally, there have been a few incidents of car-jacking by apparent homeless persons at the Edgewood Retail District and the Publix shopping center on Ponce de Leon Ave. The APD has reported arrests in both cases; however, please note that the police expect, based on prior years, for more of this kind of activity to take place on and around the holidays. Please be aware of suspicious persons—don't let your guard down! Have a safe and happy holiday, everyone!

And then there's the out-of-state elders to watch over... ah, we'll hold that thought for another day.

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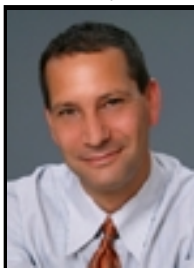
