

Thunder is Scary

The veterinary industry is not entirely sure why some pets develop a fear of thunderstorms. It could be the sound of the thunder. Other factors, such as barometric pressure and static electricity, may also contribute to the fear.

If your pets show signs of fear during storms, try not to reinforce their fearful behavior by attempting to soothe their anxiety with petting or by speaking softly to them. Removing these reinforcing actions will encourage your pet to let go of their fear more quickly.

Now for Good News

The ASPCA reports that it is leading a team of behaviorists in evaluating pit bulls taken from Falcons player Michael Vick's property during the course of the dog fighting investigation.

San Francisco-based BAD RAP (Bay Area Doglovers Responsible About Pit Bulls), a nonprofit educational resource for pit bull parents and handlers, will be working with the team to help identify which dogs are eligible for foster programs.

Other options for the rescued pit bulls may include rehabilitation as law enforcement dogs, placement in sanctuaries or, if there is no other choice, humane euthanasia. The ASPCA-led team will provide a report to the USDA; the final disposition of the dogs, however, will be decided by a federal judge.

Woodchip mulch is available at the Arizona Ave entrance to the Land Trust. We request \$15 per pickup load, you load. Deposit check or



The Conscientious Gardener

How have your yards faired after all the heat and drought? I lost a very mature shrub and a not so mature blueberry. I gave up on the veggie garden and still got a cantaloupe (a relative dwarf pictured here), some tomatoes, some green beans, and have yet to get the story on the potatoes. My new (added last year) blackberries survived just fine though the birds got the berries. Two new trees, a false cypress and a Leyland cypress have come through well thanks to copious amounts of mulch and supplemental watering.

The lawn is in pretty poor shape though the crab grass survivedingood shape. Starting with this cooler weather (temps in the 60s or lower at night) I can start reseeding. I would spread seed just before a

thorough watering of the lawn so that if you are confined to weekly watering AND no rain, the lawn may have a chance to germinate. Otherwise, just wait a little longer to plant grass seed.

You may have noticed that the flowers that survived in the neighborhood tend to be perennials. The most spectacular inhabitants of my yard were plants I cannot take any credit for -Mexican sunflowers (annuals) that the birds planted. Yes, the birds landscaped my front and back yards with birdseed. Now that the plants are pretty much spent, I have a flock of finches and chickadees parking themselves in my yard feeding on the seeds. I don't dare cut back the spent plants now. Again, the element of adventure and surprise is one of the most satisfying features of gardening for me. These charming little acrobatic birds are great fun to watch but are rather shy. So you have to sneak around sometimes to enjoy or photograph them. Don't forget



that birds need water, too. A dish of fresh water set out on your patio or deck will truly be appreciated.

Now, have you thought of your poinsettias lately? I have two that have survived. It's time to start prepping them for the holidays, which involves shielding them from sunlight while continuing to water and feed. Most publications suggest keeping them in a closet or basement. I prefer to cover ("bag" them, actually) with either a heavy-duty black trash bag or layer several bags and cover. That way I can keep the plant where I can easily

get to it and remember to water it. So go ahead and move it or cover it. Hopefully you will have some lovely color on the new growth by December.



I took a garbage can and drilled holes in the bottom for drainage, lined the bottom with a bunch of branches for air circulation, and then started filling it with fruit and vegetable waste along with coffee grounds and filters. Every now and then, I put layers of leaves or newspaper on as well.

Wanted: Atlanta Ghost Stories

Local Author Collecting Metro Area Ghost Tales For Book.

If you're already in the mood for Halloween and have a spooky, real-life story to share, freelance writer and native Atlantan Lynn Roper Bell wants to hear from you! Despite Atlanta's reputation as a city that rebuilds itself every decade, Ms. Bell knows that a great deal of history lies just beneath the shiny new veneer-along with possible ghosts. "Any place where generations of human beings have lived, worked and died is prime ground for hauntings," Lynn says. "The ghosts of Charleston, Savannah, Richmond and other Southern cities have been well-documented. But for some reason, folklorists and paranormal enthusiasts

often neglect Atlanta. I believe my home town is just as rich in ghostly lore as any other place on the map-perhaps even richer, when you consider the fact that a major Civil War battle took place here."


Drawing on a background in art history and a lifelong interest in world mythology, folklore and paranormal research, Ms. Bell has some advice for Atlanta ghost hunters. "You shouldn't automatically discount an alleged 'haunting' just because the events didn't take place in one of Atlanta's few remaining Victorian or antebellum neighborhoods. Ghostly occupants have been reported in modern condos, office

When we bought our home seven years ago we had no children and schools weren't much of a consideration. We heard Mary Lin was good but, until now, we didn't fully realize how exceptional our neighborhood elementary school truly is. The number of familiar and welcoming faces at orientation and, now in the hallways each day, is heart warming and energizing. Our daughter is

The curriculum is funded by the PTA and is not used at all APS schools.
