Lean, Mean and GREEN

How about Lean, Mean and GRAY (as in "gray water")? Our water is disappearing. There's no denying it. This is life-altering. If you have not made changes in your water usage you just might not realize how serious this is. How do we cope in meaningful ways? Hopefully we are all learning new ways to make water work harder, longer and with less waste. Yet it is safe to say that we don't all have the same understanding of what "waste water" is or what we can do with it.

"Gray water" is used water. It is what goes down the drain, out to the sewer. While our waste water is of varying degrees of "yukiness" most is re-usable. First, understand what absolutely requires treated drinkable water. That would be cooking and drinking and perhaps some medical needs. Most other household uses can do fine with nontoilet gray water. You can water plants and gardens, wash the dog and the car, flush the toilets, mop floors, take baths, and even wash clothes. My gray water sources are the bathtub and two dehumidifiers in the basement. Saving water from those two sources produced so much water that I really had to work at using it up rather than just letting it go down the drain. Then it got me thinking about how much water I routinely let go that could be recycled.

Toilet flushing is easy to get around; all you do is pour a gallon or so of gray water into the bowl and it flushes. I have found that pouring from a bucket rather than a bottle works better. Laundry is a bit trickier so I use gray water to wash, rinse in clean water, and make sure that I run full loads. Automatic dish washing uses less water than hand washing so just make sure that full loads are run there as well. Plant watering requires no explanation. You can share a bath/shower, pass on the tub water, even rotate bathing with "bird baths". We can be saving LOTS of water with a little thought and preparation. Empty gallon jugs such as the ones apple juice come in, or empty Gatorade jugs with the handles are perfect. Also the square cat litter buckets are wonderful to scoop water out of the tub. Rain barrels are great for storage and can be set up for gravity feed to the garden hose if placed high enough relative to the yard.

Cell Phone 9-1-1 Access Advisory

If you live in Atlanta-in-Dekalb and use your cell phone, your emergency 9-1-1 calls may not be immediately routed to the City of Atlanta's 9-1-1 call center. To ensure your safety, cell phone users in Atlanta-in-Dekalb are urged to dial (404) 658-6666 whenever a cell phone is used to contact a 9-1-1 operator.

Your cell phone access to "9-1-1" emergency services in Atlanta/ Dekalb County is compromised by the interaction of technical and legal procedures that determine how cell phone calls are routed to 9-1-1call centers by the cellular system. Council member Natalyn Archibong recently investigated the situation and mailed out a flier addressing this important issue and provided a list of 9-1-1 cell phone calling recommendations, reprinted here: Program the City of Atlanta (COA) emergency Services ten-digit number (alternate for 9-1-1) into your cell phone 404-658-6666. Use a name like 911-Atlanta or 911COA.

When calling Atlanta 9-1-1, please advise the dispatcher that you are a City of Atlanta resident in DeKalb County if this is appropriate for your address.

Speak as clearly as possible and give the dispatcher the basic information regarding your request as to who, what, when and where the incident is occurring or has occurred.

For responding Emergency Personnel to an emergency, readily identifiable, large community landmarks can be as important or more valuable than just the address of where the incident has occurred or is occurring. Become acquainted with your neighborhood so as to relay descriptive information to the dispatcher (for example: next to the green house with the brick mailbox on Glenwood Avenue). Address recollec-


tion in an emergency may be difficult and responding Emergency Personnel can more readily identify sizeable structures, features, characteristics and/or landmarks as compared to finding and identifying residential address numbers.

For alarm system users: Ensure that your alarm system profile includes the correct 9-1-1 Center direct dial number, (404) 658-6666, as well as the proper phone numbers for the Police and Fire Departments who are charged with responding to your address.

For Voice Over Internet Protocol (VOIP) Users: Ensure that your VOIP profile includes the correct 9-1-1 Center direct dial number, (404) 658-6666, as well as the proper phone numbers for the proper responding Police and Fire Departments.

If there is a problem or a question call the 9-1-1 Center supervisor line at (404) 817-2382.

Infant cold medications pulled amid safety concerns

Drug makers voluntarily pulled kids' cold medicines off the market less than two weeks after the government warned of potential health risks to infants.

Products aimed at children under the age of two are being removed from store shelves due to "rare instances of misuse" that could lead to accidental overdose, a trade group that represents overthe-counter drug makers said.

Cold medicines being withdrawn include: Johnson & Johnson Pediacare Infant Drops and Tylenol Concentrated Infants Drops, Wyeth's Dimetapp Decongestant Infant Drops, Novartis' Triaminic Infant & Toddler Thin Strips and Prestige Brands Holdings' Little Colds Decongestant Plus Cough.

CVS Caremark Corp. said it would remove the affected products as well as CVS-brand equivalents from store shelves.

Late last month the Food and Drug Administration tentatively recommended adding labeling to the medicines indicating they are not to be used in young children. Current labeling directs parents to consult a doctor before administering the drugs to infants and toddlers and many doctors say they are safe to use.

FDA will formally consider revising labeling at a meeting scheduled for Oct. 18-19.



From the Principal's desk . . . Mary Lin is off to a fantastic start to the 2007-2008 school year. We have 499 students, not including our one Pre-K class of 20 students. Our demographic information is as follows: 67% Caucasian, 23% African America, and 10% combined multiracial, Asian, and Hispanic. Our overall teacher to student ratio is 1:18, and all of our grade levels have less than 20 students per class, except fifth grade. Our three fifth grade classes average 23 students. Our school-wide free and reduced lunch rate is

The 2006-2007 CRCT results show that 93% of our third through fifth grade students met or exceeded expectations in Mathematics. Of the 93%, 52% of the students exceeded expec-

tations. Our Reading/Language Arts scores show that 94% of our third through fifth grade students met or exceeded expectations. Of the 94%, 45% of the students exceeded expectations on the Reading/Language Arts section of the CRCT.

Along with a strong academic program, Mary Lin will continue to focus on developing the social skills necessary for our students to be deemed successful and wellrounded. Mary Lin is in the implementation phase of one of the several components of the Penny Harvest. The Penny Harvest is an excellent opportunity for the Mary Lin teachers, students, and parents to think about and take action in areas that need attention in our community. The students will be engaged in discussions that foster generosity, responsibility, and moral character. The Penny Harvest activities are also aligned with instruction, specifically in civics and mathematics. In essence, the Penny Harvest is a way for the students to respond to community needs through first-hand donation of funds, goods, or services. Our next tour of Mary Lin will be on December 6th at 9:30. We hope to see you there!



No sooner did I submit last month's article than I noticed that the shrub I thought was dead (due to the drought) had indeed begun to sprout tiny wilted leaves. I was stunned. It had looked deader than a doornail. And I was planning to whack it with the chain saw at my next opportunity. That was a close one. I suppose we will be learning what plants will do through the drought over time. As I write I hear on the news that we may soon get state-wide watering restrictions. If this pans out, it would be worth sharing watersaving ideas. For starters, a neighbor of mine recently told me she uses the water from her dehumidifier to water her potted plants. That sounded brilliant to me. I have two units running constantly in my basement and combined they collect quite a bit of water that usually goes down the drain. Hopefully this will be enough collected to water the more delicate plants in the yard as well. I could empty the dehumidifiers into my rain barrel which is located high enough above the yard to water via gravity-fed hose. This could work!

Now, what plants are surviving this extreme summer? If you take a look around you will probably notice that far more perennials than annuals came through in decent shape. Among the hardiest of the perennials seem to be coreopsis, coneflower, butterfly bush, and mums. I have several mums that come out around this time with spectacular color. They are not disappointing me though the taller varieties seem to be stringy. Among the annuals that did well are zinnias and annual vinca.



Freedom Park Native Plant Update

It's been a long, hot summer at the Freedom Park Bird and Butterfly Garden. We've planted only native plants but, in this drought, even they, young as they are, still need water. We couldn't have kept things going water wise without the generous help of Jim Satcher, neighbor to the garden, who's let us use his spigot in these arid times.

Most of our plants have made it through. Many, such as the Arrowood, American Beautyberry and Viburnum have berries on them now. The Golden Fleece Goldenrod is blooming. The Joe Pye Weed, Purple Coneflowers and Black eyed Susans are running their course with lots of seeds available. Thanks to Dorothy Dabbs and Martha Treadwell, Atlanta Audubon members, who helped to keep the garden watered and weeded. We did lose our Swamp Azalea and our Cardinal Flowers to the drought, but all in all, the garden did pretty well under the circumstances.

In October we will be doing more planting. Phil Edwards, President of the DeKalb Master Gardener Association, has lots of plants ready to go into the ground. As of this writing we are waiting for approval from the City of Atlanta Parks Department to expand the garden to the next driveway. If we don't get that approval we will use the plants to fill in the present garden. We hope to have Mary Lin Elementary students involved in planting again, as well as volunteers from Hands on Atlanta.

Fall is a great time to plant native plants. One of the best places to get native plants is at the Georgia Perimeter College Botanical Garden at 3251 Panthersville Rd., in Decatur, 678-891-2668.

One Step at a Time?

About two years ago, residents from Candler Park and Lake Claire, along with PEDS representatives engaged in a process to evaluate safer walking routes to Mary Lin Elementary. While they discussed many long-term options, they unanimously identified one "immediate" step that would greatly improve safety: add crosswallks with "stop for pedestrians" signs at dangerous crossings on Clifton Road. They formally presented the request to the City, highlighting its importance because most of the many school children who walk to Mary Lin from Lake Claire must cross at these intersections. The crossings are especially dangerous because commuter traffic rarely stops for pedestrians and at several crossings visibility is limited.

After many months, crosswalks were painted onto the road, but incrosswalk signage was not installed. Then last May, Clifton Rd. resident Davy Smith took up the cause of traffic safety on Clifton and again began contacting the City. Lake Claire Neighbors, Inc. and numerous residents followed up with calls and letters to Mr. Lorn Whittaker, the Director of Public Works, in early October, requesting five "stop in crosswalk" signs for each intersection between McLendon and Ponce. In mid-October, we were stumped when only 3 of the 5 signs appeared, but we're very pleased that we have 3! Now we're hoping for the remaining two signs and more improvements for the safety of pedestrians.

In the meantime, please be mindful of walkers, especially if you're driving between 7:30 and 8:00 am when lots of kids are walking to school.
