
Branding Lake Claire, as an environmentally-consciousness neigh-

Lake Claire Neighbors - Meeting Highlights

Thursday, January 16, 2008 @ 7pm

Attendance: Approximately 15 people.

Officers present: Diane Moore, President and Interim Treasurer; Glenn Frankel, VP Communications; Jennifer Sams, NPU; and Kathy Evans, VP Environment.

Announcements/discussions included:

Development of "Neighborhood Identity" was discussed. President Moore suggested (and officers at Jan. planning retreat support) drawing from the community's past involvement with and commitments to environmentally friendly efforts such as: green space acquisition; establishment of a Land Trust; Friends of the Frazer Center Forest; The Native Waters Watershed Mural: Lake Claire Community Co-Housing, etc. We could focus on events and efforts to encourage and inspire each other to develop sustainable practices; build Earth Day event as our primary neighborhood event; create

a "Tour of Sustainable Homes," share lists of resources for ecofriendly services and practices; and establish recommendations for renovations and new development. Potential themes include: "Leafy Lake Claire;" "Top of the Watershed: Water Quality Begins Here;" and "Lake Claire – Striving to Be Atlanta's Greenest In-Town Neighborhood." Suggestions for more theme statements were solicited.

- Per Treasurer's report, LCN has approximately \$7,000 in the general fund. Greatest income sources are newsletter ad sales and member dues (just \$20 per household). February is dues drive month; "Show a Little Love for Your 'Hood!" All money raised goes back into the neighborhood for events like the Halloween Parade and Street Dance, and contributions to services and amenities in the neighborhood such as The Frazer Center, Freedom Park, Clifton Sanctuary Ministries, Lake Claire Park, and the Harold Avenue Greenspace.
- Police Officer Report. Sergeant Darin Schierbaum, who reported an increase in ATM personal robberies and daytime

home robberies, provided report. He conveyed a number of stories of recent arrests as a result of alert neighbors reporting suspicious behavior and encouraged residents to watch out and call 911 when in doubt. The Sergeant stressed that knowing your neighbors is the best way to both develop a sense of community and create a safer community. He gave an inspiring example of residents being saved during a multi-unit home fire because the neighbors knew that neighbors were sleeping inside and notified rescuers. The zone will be doing a sweep to look for "urban camping" north of DeKalb Ave. Social Service workers will accompany officers to offer services to those in need. To report an area that needs to be checked, write Dr. Boyce at tboyce@atlantaga.gov. Zone 6 received no new officers in last Academy class. The biggest personnel problem in APD is attrition of mid-level and experienced officers.

The Conscientious Gardener

Did you know that cats could decimate an entire local population of a bird species? I did not until recently. A good friend of mine shared this with me while birding. We both enjoy birds, particularly admiring Hummingbirds. It's a great excuse to get out and the conversation inevitably centers on environmental issues. On this day it was cats, their impact

Reducing Threats From Cats

on bird populations (particularly

urban), and the importance of

spaying and neutering.


Problem: House cats are nonnative predators. Even with a full stomach, their instinct to hunt drives them to stalk and kill available prey. In a wildlife-friendly yard, birds, small mammals, and even large insects are sitting ducks

for the well-designed feline carnivore. House cats are effective hunters but unnatural predators in any outdoor setting. By killing millions of birds each year in North America alone, cats have a negative and dangerous impact on bird populations.

Solutions:

Keep Cats Indoors

How can this help? Keeping cats indoors ensures that birds outdoors stay safe. Cats, too, benefit, as they'll be exposed to less risk of disease, parasites, predation, poison, and accidents. According the to American Humane Society, cats that are allowed to roam outside live an average of 3 years while indoor cats typically reach

an average age of 15 years.

Practicality — HIGH: There's no better way to eliminate the threat of cat predation and to protect the cats themselves.

Provide Cover

How can this help? Vegetation or a brush pile can provide a place for birds to escape to and hide. Plants should be close enough to feeders (10-12 feet) to allow feeding birds a safe approach and quick escape, but far enough away to enable a clear view of approaching cats.

Practicality — HIGH: As you develop a yard that is safe for wildlife, it's easy to include dense vegetation or a brush pile in your plans.

Deter With Water

How can this help? A gentle spray of water from a water pistol or plant bottle can encourage cats to vacate your wildlife-friendly environs.

Practicality – MED: An inexpensive cat-deterrent but dependent on your vigilance when cats are present. It also may take repeated and consistent spraying to get the point across. Other humane methods of making cats unwelcome include motion-activated sprinklers at entrance points, cat-proof fencing, and thorny brambles under feeders.

Humane Traps

How can this help? Humane traps provide the means to trap visiting cats so that they may be transported safely to the local



animal shelter.

Practicality – HIGH: In some cases, local animal control authorities can trap stray or troublesome cats. Otherwise, traps can be purchased at your local home center and reused if the problem persists.

Ultrasound Deterrents

How can this help? Using ultrasound deterrents in the yard eliminates the need for physical barriers. The best devices use motion/heat detectors geared specifically for cats.

Practicality – MED: Ultrasound deterrents can be expensive and on larger properties, more than one might be needed. But they have proven to work successfully.

Communication

How can this help? Talking with your neighbors and asking them



to keep their cats indoors or confined to their yard can help eliminate a problem at its source.

Practicality – MED: It's not always easy to approach your neighbors about their pets, but it will go a long way to save birds. Additional Resources:

Grady's 2008 Graduation ceremony will be held on Wednesday, May 28, at 5:30 PM. Rehearsal will be held on Tuesday, May 27th, from 9-10:30 AM

Partial Checklist for Seniors:

- Re-Check your credits for graduation. Last fall, the counselors audited your school record and you should know if you have all the required courses and credits, whether you passed all the necessary tests, and whether there any adjustments needed in your schedule to meet graduation requirements or admissions requirements for potential colleges or schools. If you are unclear about any of this, see your counselor now!
- Apply for a social security number if you do not already have one. Get a state photo ID if you do not have a driver's license. Register with the Selective Service if necessary.
- Compile a student resume documenting everything you have done since 9th grade including extracurricular activities, awards, community service, etc. to give to counselors and teachers for college and job recommendations.
- Confirm application deadlines for colleges to which you plan to apply. If you need to send midyear transcripts to schools to which you have already applied, be sure to make your request to the Counseling Office at least two weeks before the deadline. Provide stamped, addressed envelopes.
- Continue checking for scholarship offers. File all applications by the deadlines and with all requirements met. Good websites for scholarship searches include fastweb.com and gocollege. com.

- College Application Fees: typically range from \$25-\$50 (fee waivers sometimes available through the college)
- FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid): FREE. Should be filed in February or March. Check with the Counselors about specific deadlines.
- NCAA Initial Eligibility Clearinghouse-Student Release Form (student athletes only): \$50 (fee waivers available if student received waiver for SAT or ACT)
- Senior Prom: FREE for seniors (unless junior dues were not paid, \$100)
- Graduation Invitations: Varies depending on number ordered.
- Class Ring: Varies depending on ring chosen







Continuing Series: From Lake Claire to the Heights of Mount Everest

Everest Training Part 1: Deer Hunting and the Roofing Business A big part of mountain climbing is mental toughness. Exposure to bitter cold, long days confined in a tent, trudging along with a heavy pack on... these conditions demand an abundance of determination, perseverance, and fortitude. You need to be tough. Not like the toughest kid on the playground tough... but rather mental toughness.

Without realizing it, my Everest training in this area actually started while growing up in northeastern Pennsylvania. My father and I would go deer hunting: the first morning you'd head out into the woods while it was still dark and mighty cold, take position at your stand, and then sit there, motionless, for hours on end. If you sneezed, itched, even ate a candy bar, your sounds and movements might scare aware a deer, thereby interfering with your primary purpose. You had to be mentally tough and suck it up. When facing the harsh conditions on the mountainside, you also need to roll with it. There's no running back to a warm living room... you're kind of stuck out there... and you better have the ability to find some inner strength to deal with the demanding environment.

More training took place early on via my dad's construction business. Part of his operation involved roofing and unlike some construction crews, his team did not take the winter season off. I recall one job in particular we were doing on a January weekend. It was downtown, near our local bank. The bank had one of those early electronic thermometers... it read minus 20 F. As a teenage boy, it sure seemed cold... but the guys in my hometown area were pretty hardy... there was a job to do, there was no sense dragging it out... everyone just worked away as if it were forty degrees warmer.

These early experiences somehow make their way into your DNA, your make-up I think. Whereas I enjoy a warm November in Atlanta, I can also pretty easily switch gears, thanks to these experiences, and be 'ok' in some bitter, arctic-like environments. I'm hopeful this ability improves my odds on Mount Everest in 2008. From FAQs:

Why do mountaineers climb at night?



Night travel is for safety and efficiency reasons... typically, the weather is clearer and more stable in the evening and very importantly, the colder night temperatures ensure a more frozen climbing surface... necessary for effective cramponing. As the ground warms later in the day, snow and ice conditions worsen, making travel more laborious and unsafe. Rocks previously frozen to the ground often will loosen, causing dangerous rock falls and heavier, wetter snow is more likely to avalanche.


