

Does your dog drive you crazy with that one bad habit? Could your pooch use a refresher on manners? Are you struggling with chewing or aggression issues?

We hope you'll join us at our Polite Pup seminars! Work with certified trainers to change your dog into a polite pup! And attend our informative, people-only seminars and learn about how to address issues like fear, aggression, chewing and potty training.

All participants MUST pre-register, because we want to make sure we'll have enough materials for everyone. Taking your pet on the plane? Here are some policies to note: Baby on board: While some airlines only fly pets more than weeks eight old, US Airways, JetBlue and Spirit don't have age requirements.

Beyond dogs and cats: Delta allows birds, ferrets, rabbits, hamsters and guinea pigs (and some dogs and cats) in the cabin.

Two's company:

Spirit, American and Northwest allow two pets per carrier (restrictions apply).

Load limit: AirTran and Delta don't have weight restrictions as long as pets fit comfortably in their carriers.



Current Water Restrictions

GovernorSonnyPerduehassigned legislation that overrides Atlanta's watering restrictions. As of May 15, the following is allowed: Hand-watering for 25 minutes. Hand watering is defined as one person with one garden hose with a spray nozzle that shuts off when it is released. Residents who complete the Outdoor Water Use Registration Program (www.urbanagcouncil. com) may water newly installed landscaping and newly seeded or aerated lawns for 10 weeks, subject to the same times and days mentioned above; and watering of personal food gardens. All watering is subject to the following time and day restrictions; Persons living at even-numbered addresses may water between 12:01 am and 10 am on Mondays, Wednesdays and Saturdays, and those living at odd-numbered addresses may water between 12:01 am and 10 am on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Sundays. The Department of Watershed Management urges customers to be aware that Atlanta is still suffering from a severe drought and to conserve water whenever possible. #6 Plastic Recycling The Experiment Starts This Month

On an experimental basis, our neighbors at Lake Claire Co-housing have agreed to provide a collection bin for #6 plastic in their parking area. Also experimentally, the Recycling Guy and His Dog - alias Paul

Reece and Otis - have agreed to begin picking it up. Once Paul has an idea what the quantity is likely to

be, he will figure out what to charge us, and at that point we will figure out how to fund it. Please note that this bin is for #6 plastic ONLY, as this type is not accepted by the city's curbside pickup program. Paul is the only recycler we know of in metro Atlanta who accepts #6, and luckily his route brings him through our neighborhood every Wednesday. #6 plastic (PS, polystyrene)



includes most disposable plastic cups and many takeout containers. Please look closely at the recycling symbol before assuming it's #6, as these items may also be #1 (PET, polyethylene terephthalate). Note that Styrofoam is also #6, but we are not collecting Styrofoam at this point. If any item has no recycling symbol (a triangle of arrows, usually on the bottom, with a number in the middle), it must unfortunately be considered trash. Of course, recycling a disposable cup or container is no substitute for carrying a re-usable one. Please accept any disposable item only as a last resort. (As in, "Darn, I washed that container and forgot to put it

Coneheads are not aliens!

Whatever Saturday Night Live propaganda you may have been exposed to it's time to face the fact: Coneheads (and their parental units) are natives! Coneheads, i.e., the ones with purple heads also know as Purple Coneflowers (Echinacea purpurea) are plants native to North America!

These Coneheads are likely to be found in dry open woods, road banks and prairies from Ohio and Iowa, south to Louisiana and Georgia. In the garden they grow to 5 feet tall, prefer sun to part shade and dry soil. They bloom from June to October and are both heat and drought tolerant. The seeds will spread easily and will reshow in the garden. They can also be propagated by rootball division.

Coneheads – I mean Coneflowers – are great for wildlife. Insects and butterflies, including Tiger Swallowtails, love them for their nectar. Old flower heads provide seed for songbirds, including the beautiful American Goldfinch.

This plant has long been known for improving the body's resistance to infections of all kinds. Native people used it for to ease headaches, toothaches and sore gums. It is the infamous "snake oil" of the past, used as a poultice for snake bites and blood poisoning.

Echinacea, the coneflower's genus name is said to have been derived from the Greek word for hedgehog, which its central cone resembles. Check out the purple coneflower in the Freedom Park Bird and But terfly Garden, at the corner of North Ave., and Candler Park Drive.





Editorial

Dear Lake Clairians,


I have recently been struck by the constellation of examples of assaults on the integrity of our neighborhoods as well as the examples of citizens attempting to address them. For whatever reason, a bigger picture seems to be emerging as I observe a number of "local" issues being played out. Last week, for example, I attended the Atlanta City Council meeting at which several seemingly unrelated issues were addressed by citizen speakers. It was an "aha" moment.

We heard from individuals objecting to the firing of Tom Coffin, Senior Arborist. He has made available statistics which support his contention that his firing may have been prompted by his being tenacious in his enforcement of the current tree ordinances. Others spoke their objections to the closing of Firehouse #7, said to have been done due to a budget shortfall. Another group of citizens from the Georgia Dome were there to bring attention to their community's plight in part due to the lack of enforcement of existing codes and ordinances. Their community is clogged with burned-out or abandoned houses, trash, vagrancy, drugs and more. All they wanted was for the City to do its job and with the same value and regard for their neighborhood as city council would want for their own.

I sat there listening to all this as I mulled over the problems we try to address here in Lake Claire. We have in-fill development issues many of which stem from lack of enforcement of current ordinances. We have new water meter hardware that may or may not work or fit yet

no one is coming around to fix the new equipment. We paid for this and it seems no one is enforcing the contract. Crime is up. On and on. Then it occurred to me that we are in danger of losing our neighborhoods. There is a slow process of erosion happening. Decisions, actions and inactions are happening at our expense and to the benefit of people who do not live here. We are losing our precious trees. We are losing touch with the people who supposedly work for us. We are not getting the services and protections we expect and pay for. We may think we are not English Avenue but we are in the same boat.


We need to decide where to draw the line and then stand there and draw it. Drawing the line means placing ourselves in some way between where we are and where we may end up. That means getting involved. That means being

vigilant, being present, sharing your experiences (good and bad) of this neighborhood, helping the rest of us benefit from your experience, letting us help each other when needed, going to neighborhood meetings, attending city council meetings, communicating with your representatives, be they neighborhood, city, county or state level on up. We are not alone and we are by no means out of the woods.

In response to my email to Mary Norwood about my concerns, she wrote back: "At today's council meeting, I will introduce a resolution calling for investigation of the termination of Tom Coffin and broader questions regarding ac-

Sean Beeching: Lichenologist

Many people are unfamiliar with lichens, a cross between an algae and a fungus. Lake Claire neighbor Sean Beeching, on the other hand, is very familiar with these specimens, as he happens to be one of Georgia's own well known lichenologists.

Mr. Beeching first became interested in lichens in 2003, while on a field trip with the Botanical Society about lichens. For those who knew Mr. Beeching well, his sudden interest in lichens did not come as a surprise. Even as a young boy Mr. Beeching showed interest in microscopes, plants, and identifying things in nature. He can't describe exactly what it is about lichens he finds so interesting, but Mr. Beeching says one of the things he enjoys most is the field work involved with studying lichens. "You get to spend just as much time out in the field looking [for lichens] as you do indoors identifying them," Mr. Beeching said. "This is not usually the case [when studying things]."

Mr. Beeching currently devotes about three or four hours everyday to finding and identifying lichens. He does most of his searching in public areas like parks and state hunting grounds. He is occasionally granted permission

to use private land, and he also finds riversides and roadsides to be excellent lichen areas.

In fall 2003 Mr. Beeching started getting involved with other Georgia lichenologists when he contacted UGA professor Bob Hill on the internet. Mr. Beeching and Dr. Hill began collaborating and Dr. Hill decided to start a workshop at UGA, to educate teachers about lichens, with Mr. Beeching as one of the workshop instructors.

"Once I was hired to teach I decided to systematically identify all of the lichens in Georgia," Mr. Beeching said. "And that's when I got serious."

Dr. Hill introduced Mr. Beeching to the rest of Georgia's lichenologists, including James Lendemer. Mr. Lendemer and Mr. Beeching ended up discovering a new species of lichen, Megalaria beechingii Lendemer, found in Rabun County. They also renamed a lichen Piccolia nannaria (Tuck.) Lendemer and Beeching, based on Mr. Beeching's findings of the species in Talbot County.

"Finding a new species that you can take credit for or help take credit for is the most exciting part [of studying lichens]," Mr. Beeching said. "When people want to know if I'm worth while or not I tell them about these two lichens. because I don't have a degree."

In addition to these two lichens, Mr. Beeching has also found about five species of lichen that

hadn't been seen in North America before. He's sent species to Germa-England, ny, and Austria to be studied lichenologists in those countries. He found a lichen, Lepraria squamatica, on Cumberland Island that had never been seen before except in Austria and Brazil. Mr. Beeching expects that only 800 out of 1000 species of Georgia lichen have been identified.

"Lichens are pretty unexplored in the southern US," Mr. Beeching said. "But the Southeast is a very good place for [lichens], which means there are a lot out there, waiting to be discovered." The UGA lichen course has been taught for four years and a grant will allow the workshop to continue for another two years.

"The most important part of what I do is teaching other teachers about lichens," Mr. Beeching said, "so they can teach their own students about lichens, even if they don't become lichen experts themselves."

In addition to helping teach the lichen course at UGA, Mr. Beeching also writes articles for peer-reviewed journals such as The Bryologist and Opuscula. He's given a two-day seminar for Georgia Botanical Society in Panola Mountain State Park and led a field trip about lichens in Athens. His most recent event took place on June 12 in Palmetto, GA, where he gave a lecture on lichens.

Mr. Beeching's house is currently filled with samples of about 6,000 different specimens of lichens, which will soon be donated to the Georgia Natural History Museum. In the meantime, Mr. Beeching continues to collect these interesting specimens, always on the lookout for something new.

If you jog, walk, or bike the PATH that traverses Freedom Park, you know what a wonderful asset the park is to our neighborhoods. You may have also noticed that the light fixtures in the park are deteriorating and rust is eroding the poles at the base. The Freedom Park Improvement Committee (PIC), working under the Freedom Park Conservancy, has helped the city maintain the park over the years by removing unsightly graffiti and kudzu. On Oct. 4, the PIC is partnering with Hands on Atlanta and Park Pride to somewhat rejuvenate the light poles. With a cadre of volunteers we plan to wire brush the rust, paint the base area with Rustoleum and paint the poles to a 5-foot level. Please consider joining us on Oct. 4 for the project. The day starts at 9 AM and ends at 1 PM with a Hands On picnic at Centennial Park for all volunteers. Parking will be on the south side of the Carter Center and work will begin between Highland and the ice canopy along the PATH. All materials and water will be provided. Grassroots Service and City Church - Eastside

As a three year resident of Lake Claire and a pastor, I have been keen to lead a church whose work would seamlessly blend into the fabric of our local community. Six months ago, we launched a new church for the city's Eastside, appropriately called City Church-Eastside (www.citychurcheastside.org), currently meeting in the community center at Studioplex Lofts, near the confluence of Old Fourth Ward and Inman Park neighborhoods. In addition to communicating historic and orthodox Christianity on Sundays, we seek to communicate a community-oriented vision of service through our hands and feet, encouraging the City Church community to serve locally. We are accomplishing this in two ways right now. First, we encourage our church community to partner with local communities and social service providers rather than "reinventing the wheel" with a separate(d) ministry. This allows us to be more de-centralized into the communities we live in. Second, each City Church-Eastside neighborhood has a "missional community group" (including one in Lake Claire) who once a month, in lieu of a more traditional meeting in a home, meet in the community to serve. Each missional community becomes a "church" within a community in this way.

At the July Lake Claire neighborhood meeting, I had the opportunity to share about one of our community service efforts that represents this vision. For many months now, Fire Station #12, on DeKalb Avenue in Candler Park, which serves our neighborhood, has been in the news due to their



desperate need for repairs to their station at a time when the city's budget was tightened and money could not be found for the repairs. So, on June 28th, we held at the corner of McLendon and Clifton a community-wide yard sale that raised nearly \$3000, beating our goal of \$2500! Channel 46 news, which originally aired the story of the station's misfortunes, ran stories on the fundraiser on two different nights, getting out the



word about how a community was able to rally around those who put their lives on the line daily to serve us. As a result of the successful yard sale, we have decided to make this an annual event, picking a local service provider or similar entity for which to raise funds.

Let me just personally say "thank you" to those of you who either donated goods for the sale or purchased items. In doing so,

Where is the supervision and accountability? We need to let the powers that be know that we have noticed, and demand that our employees be held accountable for the performance of their duties. And insist that those who chose not to do their jobs are fired and replaced.
