General Gordon's **Legacy of Education**

I recently had the pleasure of visiting the Hargrett Rare Book Archives at UGA in Athens where I spent two days reviewing their extensive Gordon family collection. I was able to acquire a copy of Caroline Gordon's Autobiography, "De General N' Miz Fanny", which are her memoirs of growing up at Sutherland, the Gordon Estate.

One large file was titled, "The Black Gordon's". John and Fanny Gordon believed that the future of the south lay in educating ALL its people. They founded several "Negro" schools. A former slave, Buddy Hampton (Hampton Terrace?), helped nurse General Gordon back to health after he was severely wounded during the Civil War. After the war, in gratitude, General and Mrs. Gordon sent for Buddy and paid for him to acquire a college education. Years later, Buddy returned to thank the Gordon family stating that due to his education, he had prospered and was able to provide college educations for all of his own children.

John and Fanny owned two slaves named Jim and Sarah. When John and Fanny met and fell in love (1854), Jim and Sarah equally fell in love. The two couples were both married on the same day. Jim and Sarah also had a long and happy marriage. After emancipation, they chose to remain with John and



family as paid companions for 40 years. They had their own house at Sutherland and the black and white Gordon children grew up together. All four of Jim and Sarah's children graduated from Morehouse College. After Jim's death, Sarah moved to California to be with her children. Extensive correspondence between the white Gordons in Georgia and the black Gordons in California reveals an affectionate relationship as they recalled their happy days together at Sutherland. In 1955, Sarah's grandson, Walter A. Gordon, was appointed Governor of the Virgin Islands by President Eisenhower.


Boy Scouting makes a big difference at Harold Avenue Greenspace

On Sept 20 and 27th Lake Claire Neighbors provided the materials necessary to make improvements to the streetscape of the Harold Ave green space. Using the volunteer labor of local Boy Scouts, The Greenspace Committee sponsored Wesley Swift (a Harold Avenue resident) in this project that will qualify Wesley for his Eagle Scout ranking, Scouting's highest achievemen. The project consists of stream cleanup, stream bank tree stabilization, and invasive removal along the streetscape, mulching, and the installation of a new cedar fence along the edge of the streetscape.

This project was designed and implemented by Wesley who estimated and ordered all the materials necessary to complete the project. Wesley submitted his plan to the Greenspace Committee this summer along with his cost estimates of around \$700. The Committee unanimously approved to fund the project from the money budgeted in 2008 from Lake Claire Neighbors for green space maintenance. With these expenditures and the installation of new benches earlier in the year the committee will have spent the \$1000 budgeted for improvements to the green space for 2008.

A Letter to the Editor

About "Kill Animal Shelters" I used to volunteer at a Society for Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (SPCA) shelter in Massachusetts. You could label it as a "kill shelter" because they did have to euthanize animals when there was no chance for adoption due to illness, temperament, etc. I get defensive when I hear people labeling "kill shelters" as evil. I noticed some very strong language related to that label in the Sept. Clarion and would like to express a few points in response. I feel very strongly about this issue as dedicated staff and volunteers do their best to adopt and preserve animal life everyday. Labeling shelters as "kill shelters" is presenting a complicated issue as

very cut and dry (kill = evil and $no \ kill = not \ evil) \ and \ perpetu$ ating only one side of the story. "No Kill" shelters don't take in every animal presented to them. That's called "limited admission". That way the animals they do take can be adopted. There's nothing wrong with that policy, but people need to realize that in order for the shelter to be "no kill", animals that need to be cared for are turned away. "Kill" shelters have "open admission"--no animal, no matter how sick or mistreated, is accepted into the shelter. As a result, staff and volunteers work extremely hard with limited resources to increase the possibility of adoption. But, due to circumstances beyond the shelter's control, animals in their care can not be safely adopted out without putting others animals (including humans) at risk of harm. The key point is that a shelter is not to blame for having to euthanize animals. In my direct experience with SPCA shelters, I've seen staff put the animal's needs first despite low wages, paltry resources, and extremely heated personnel interactions. If you want to "point a finger" and say something is evil, point it at the people mistreating the animals to begin with. The shelters, "kill" or "no kill" are doing their best to deal with an inherently difficult and sometimes "no win" situation. Sincerely,

ing until the cold sets in (that is if it does set in).

If you do decide to go for the fauna remember that gardens for birds and butterflies need to have a variety of plants which provide food, shelter, water, a place to raise young and, in the case of some butterflies, a mud puddle. Plants which supply birds with food usually have berries and seeds available. Also, birds need small trees, bushes, vines and other sheltered places to nest as well as plants which provide nesting material.

Butterflies are attracted to plants which provide nectar. They like sunny places that are sheltered from the wind. They also need plants that their caterpillars can feed on. And some butterflies enjoy a mud puddle bath.

Bird and butterfly gardens are best if multi-layered, that is, having plants and trees of various heights and widths. The more diverse the merrier, much like we'd like the world at large to be.





LCNA sponsors ivy removal in Frazer Forest

On September 19, 2008 The Friends of the Frazer Forest under the sponsorship of Lake Claire Neighbors initiated an effort to remove 1.5 acres of English Ivy and Wisteria from the entrance to the Frazer Forest along the drive leading from the front gate to the stone bridge - a distance of 450 ft. On each side of the road -100 ft on the right side and 50 ft on the left side of the drive – the ivy and wisteria will be removed by herbicide by a state licensed contractor.

The Friends of the Frazer Forest over the last 5 years have made a series of improvements in the Frazer Forest- a 30 acre parcel of old growth hardwood forest in Lake Claire. Over this time period trails have been mulched, pedestrian foot bridge and benches installed, stream bank stabilization implemented in critical areas due to storm water erosion coming from our neighborhood, and invasive plants removed. There is much to be done but much has been accomplished. Lake Claire Neighbors through its annual gifts to the Frazer Center earmarked for forest care has spearheaded all the improvements made to the forest.

Thanks to our membership for the support of this vital resource. By next spring the view along the drive will be very different and with any luck native pants will have started to regenerate in this portion of the forest.
