
sign to the neighborhood, and we have received some beautiful designs.























Lake Claire Wins "Love Your Block" Grant

Harold Avenue Greenspace

James Ezelio, as noted on Page 1, was able to get a block grant for Lake Claire designated for improvement of our neighborhood greenspaces. One of those is the Harold Avenue Grenspace. At the corner of Marion and Harold Avenues, the Greenspace is an overgrown lot, inaccessible behind a wood railing. As noted in an article in the 2010 Clarion, the value of the Greenspace, which the City of Atlanta has designated as a passive greenspace under the stewardship of the Lake Claire neighborhood, may not be immediately obvious in our hyper-connected, instantdelivery world. But a wide variety of animals, plants, and insects make the area their home, and it is a door into the diverse culture deeper into the Frazer Forest. It sounds different here. Smells different. Looks different. As noted in the 2010 article, "This entryway to the forest is our own neighborhood branch of Zoo Atlanta. And while pandas are unlikely to show their furry faces here, when we peer over the edge into the dappled light, a friendly raccoon just might

be gazing back, or the startling eyes of an owl, or the soft shape of a rabbit. Wait quietly and look, and be rewarded with the flickering dance of small wings among the branches."*

Undisturbed for many years, the three lots of the Harold Avenue Greenspace were under consideration for private development in the early 2000s. Through negotiations among the City, development interests. and the neighborhood, these lots were transferred to City ownership in 2007, with the understanding that Lake Claire would take responsibility for this ecologically strategic land. In 2010, Lake Claire began the process of ecologically integrating the nascent greenspace with the Frazer Forest.

Invasive species have mostly

been cleared, thanks to neighborhood efforts, and the land is ready for the native ecosystem to return. The battle with invasive species will continue, as kudzu, privet, mahonia, nandina, liriope, and Japanese stilt grass are relentless competitors, and animals continue to bring new seeds to the Greenspace from nearby yards. Native plantings, however, will help bring the ecosystem back into equilibrium, giving local plants a head start. With ongoing care (and your help in removing invasive plants from your own yards), this site can be completely transformed.

A new planting plan is ready for installation (see the wish list on page 5 and the pictures on this page), with plants chosen to mimic naturally occurring plant communities in this area, the Piedmont physiographic region. These plants provide

food, shelter, and nesting areas for forest creatures, from simple chickadees to swooping owls. Fruit-producing trees offer tasty treats for foxes and raccoons, yet will be located away from vehicular traffic so as to not lure critters to dangerous places. Along the sunny street edge, colorful perennials and a variety of native shrubs in interesting shapes and hues will be planted. These sunnier plants are key food and shelter providers for birds, butterflies, and bees. Benches along the street edge are a comfortable distance from the bird bath and butterfly rocks, inviting shy animals to linger in plain sight. The existing stump circle and basketball goal remain clear of new plantings to give room for impromptu gatherings -- and foul balls. And the overlooks along the existing Boy Scouts' fence give us oppor-

tunities for peering into the beyond.

There was a gardening workday at Harold Avenue Greenspace on Saturday, July 27, and more opportunities to help will be announced in the near future (keep your eye on the LC website – and on the Clarion, to the extent that we are able to be timely, since we are a monthly newspaper). August into September in the Garden

What a wonderful summer in the garden! No watering needed in weeks. Temperatures hitting 90 only three times by mid-summer. A riot of flowers. Daylilies blooming that have not made the effort in years. Vegetables and fruits pouring in: as of July 14 162 cherry tomatoes off one plant; 35 regular-sized tomatoes off six other plants, one weighing 19 oz. The last of the lettuce. So far the squash, netted until it bloomed, has not collapsed with borer, and I have harvested some pattypans. Chard in all colors, basil, peppers, eggplants. The cool temperatures with rain make nightshade diseases inevitable, and my Fairy Tale eggplant in a pot seems to have verticillium wilt; but that is a small, contained disappointment. I will plant another in a new pot.

The temperatures this year have been incredible, incredibly low, that is. Last year, June 30, 101 degrees; this year, 83. Last year July 3, 96 degrees, and going back for several years, 91, 82, 89, and 89. This year 75. A combination of a mild winter, so that our plants got going early (IF you planted them), and a rainy late spring and summer have given us gardener's paradise. Noting rainfall is just as delightful. We had 7.2" in June and 4.5" by mid July even in our dry northeast quadrant of Atlanta. A total of 41.3" for the year so far.

But don't forget the fall garden. By mid-August we need to plant our last bean seeds, Irish potatoes if we try them again, squash seeds, and tomato plants. I hope you remembered to start the brassicas. If not, look for broccoli and cauliflower plants at our local hardware stores. By September you will need to seed beets, carrots, cucumbers, and turnips.

How do I know all this? The Farmers and Consumers Market Bulletin, published by the Georgia Department of Agriculture, gives us spring and fall planting schedules for vegetable gardens plus many interesting articles and classified ads for Georgia agricultural products, including seeds and plants. Naturally, this periodical mirrors the conventional viewpoint of business farming. However, in the recent past, the Bulletin has been open to showing the home gardener a variety of methods, organic and non-organic, to plant and produce food. If food production is not a life and death matter for you, why risk harm? In addition, the Bulletin now focuses on Georgia grown foods you can purchase as well as articles on individual farms and suppliers. Go to www.georgiagrown.com for more information.

With all the rain, be vigilant about emptying anything on your property that holds water. This includes clogged gutters, pot saucers, and turned up lids of any kind. It takes several days for a mosquito egg to hatch into a larva and then into another mosquito. And it takes a day or two for tap water to lose its chlorine

and be suitable for egg laying. If you have containers of still water like rain barrels or birdbaths, then consider adding mosquito dunks, which will kill the larvae without harming birds or fish. Read directions carefully.

It is not too late to start biennials and perennials from seed for next year, especially foxgloves. which for me are the easiest and look the most amazing. Seeds still in the stores may not be as fresh as those kept by seed companies. Take a look at sites for Select Seeds http://www.selectseeds.com/ and Thompson and Morgan http://www.tmseeds. com/ to see what is available. Also, this year I discovered another good site run by another old curmudgeon like me, J. L. Hudson http://www.jlhudsonseeds.net/index.htm . Although there are no photographs in his catalogs, he carries many rare and unusual seeds, including leonitus Staircase, which I am growing for the first time this year. It is African and will be an annual here.

Never scorn annuals, however. I notice they have made a comeback, a sensible solution for the South where perennials finish their show in June, leaving the landscape pretty barren except for the crape myrtles. Annuals are a worthy flower here because we have a long growing season, and they will reward us from spring into December sometimes. I think I mentioned that my sweet alyssum, salvia Victoria

and Coral Nymph, and laurentia came through the winter as well as the nicotiana. So note what you like in gardens as you walk through Lake Claire, ask people what they are growing, and vow to try some yourself next spring. Many are simple to sow from seed (marigolds, zinnias, and impatiens, for instance), and I have had great success with new ones (for me) such as angelonia and laurentia. Torenia is a perky little plant, full of tiny flowers in purple, pink, white, etc., that loves shade as much as impatiens. Often it self-seeds too. All the annual salvias (both coccinea and farinacea) are easy to germinate and may survive the winter if they have good drainage, like the low bank around my pond.

Next month I will remind you to sow sweet peas and the other flowers that do best in our spring gardens if planted in October. Meanwhile, please continue monitoring and harvesting your gardens daily. Deadhead the flowers. I hope that we will continue to have good rain and that your mulching has forestalled the weeds. But really there is nothing like weeding to have you notice what is wrong in the garden and what is beautiful and astounding.

Don't Commit Crepe Murder!

Please, please, do not hard prune or top prune your crepe myrtles. Please don't pay someone else to do so. It's a common scam by itinerant yard laborers and unscrupulous "landscapers." It is inappropriate to do so, for a variety of reasons.

It makes crepe myrtles far less tolerant to weather extremes, very vulnerable to insect damage, and promotes disease and early death. Worst of all it keeps them from reaching their natural form and maturity as 15-20 foot understory shade trees with a beautiful barkless surface. Crepe myrtles allowed a natural form will bloom annually and often heavily. Only side sprouts and suckers should be carefully

pruned.

In contrast hard or top pruning, "crepe murder," often produces a badly stunted malformed tree that blooms little, often appears yellowed and diseased, and looks unnatural and ugly. They serve no functional purpose and produce no shade, few if any blooms, and do not help manage water run off

For examples of maturing and properly pruned crepe myrtles visit the Gilliam Park trees, 1684 Wade Avenue NE, 30317, and the many maturing crepe myrtles along Howard Street, N.E.




Third Country Readings Presented by Horizon

The play is inspired by the Clarkston, Georgia community where thousands of refugees have been resettled over the last decade.

Horizon will present two readings of Third Country during the workshop process, the first on Sunday, August 11 at the Clarkston Community Center and a second at Horizon on Monday, August 12. Both readings will be followed by an open dialogue with the playwright and director to collect audience thoughts and feedback.

The story revolves around



Nura, a refugee, who clings to her soccer ball like a lifeline. She meets Sasha, a resettlement worker, who is her guide to a strange new home in this small Southern town. Playwright Suehyla El-Attar (Horizon's *The Perfect Prayer*) was inspired by real life events in nearby Clarkston, Georgia, where thousands of refugees from around the world have been resettled over the last

decade. With wit and optimism, El-Attar looks at a community in transition, and what happens when we must redefine and share our homes. This is a poignant new play from our own changing backyard.

The Third Country Reading at the Clarkston Community Center begins on Sunday, August 11, with a reception at 6:30 p.m., followed by the reading at 7:30 p.m., at 3701 College Avenue, Clarkston, GA 30021. Happy Basil Recipe Winners

Basil and Cantaloupe Agua Fresca

Blend following ingredients, you will want to blend until no more green bits of basil are visible:

2 cantaloupe melons, Handful of basil or more to taste, 3 lemons, 1 lime, 2 cups of ice, 1/4 cup sugar heated with 1/4 cup of water (simple syrup) (More or less

simple syrup can be added depending on the sweetness of the fruit.)

Let the agua fresca chill for 30 min. before drinking. **Enjoy.** Agua Frescas are traditional in Mexico and South America. Watermelon is a frequently used main ingredient; however, strawberries, papayas, and mangos are also often used. - Eva

Basil Ice Cream (Gourmet October 2004)

2 cups whole milk, 3 tablespoons chopped fresh basil, 1/2 cup sugar, 4 large egg yolks, 1/2 cup well-chilled heavy cream. Special equipment: an instantread thermometer; an ice cream maker.

Bring milk, basil, 1/4 cup sugar, and a pinch of salt to a boil in a 2-quart heavy saucepan, stirring. Then remove from heat and let steep 30 minutes. Transfer to a blender (reserve saucepan), and blend until basil is finely ground, about 1 minute. Beat together yolks and remaining 1/4 cup sugar in a medium bowl with an electric mixer until thick and pale, about 1 minute. Add milk mixture in a stream, beating until combined well. Pour mixture into reserved saucepan and cook over moderate heat, stirring constantly with a wooden spoon, until mixture coats back of spoon and registers 175°F on thermometer (do not let it boil). Immediately remove from heat and pour through a fine-mesh sieve into a metal bowl. Set bowl in a larger

bowl of ice water and stir until cold, 10 to 15 minutes. Stir in cream and freeze in ice cream maker. Transfer ice cream to an airtight container and put in freezer to harden, at least 2 hours.

Alice's Goat Cheese Spread

A full 10.5 oz log of goat cheese makes enough spread for a party, and you will need a generous handful (about a cup, packed) of basil to give it enough flavor. If in doubt, add more herb. Serve with pita chips. Ingredients:

fresh goat cheese, olive oil to taste, fresh basil (cilantro, parsley, etc., single or in combination also work great), and freshly ground black pepper to taste. Mash the goat cheese with a fork with some olive oil and black pepper; add finely chopped herb of choice and mix well.
